We're back, baby! The wait is over—IU Cinema's fall season is here, and it is glorious (we may be biased). This August and September, we're bringing you all the goodies, including:

- New Americas Cinema: highlighting the best new art house and independent filmmaking from North, Central, and South America, this fall's line-up has a scorching neo-noir starring Kristen Stewart and IU alumna Katy O'Brian (Love Lies Bleeding), Chile's devastatingly life-affirming 2024 Oscars nominee for Best Documentary Feature (The Eternal Memory), the buzzy and iconoclastic festival favorite that has had the critics raving this year (I Saw the TV Glow), a new 4K restoration of Glauber Rocha's searing indictment of social dangers like fanaticism (Black God, White Devil), and a coming-of-age tale about a son's reckoning with his father's violent legacy (Sujo).
- Everyone Wants to Be Cary Grant: a tribute to the genius of Cary Grant, this series is comprised of four of the legendary actor's greatest hits. Be sure to also check out our delightful lower lobby display dedicated to Grant, featuring items from the Lilly Library.
- Kevin Willmott: By Any Means Necessary!: in partnership with the Black Film Center & Archive, we're thrilled to welcome Oscar-winning filmmaker Kevin Willmott, who will be present for an onstage conversation and screenings of *The 24th* (co-written and directed by Willmott) and BlackkKlansman (co-written with Spike Lee, among others).
- · Duplicity, Deception, and Detail: The Cinematic World of John le Carré: this semester's Michael A. McRobbie's Choice series celebrates the work of author John le Carré with three film adaptations, each providing a different shade of le Carré's enduring impact and cultural legacy.

Plus, Mad Max: Fury Road in 3D, a special 35th anniversary presentation of Batman with producer Michael Uslan, an award-winning new film from our friends at Pigasus Pictures, a 95th anniversary screening of *Pandora's Box* for Silent Movie Day, and more!

KEVIN WILLMOTT

Eleven years after his first visit in 2013, IU Cinema, in partnership with the Black Film Center & Archive (BFCA), is proud to welcome Kevin Willmott back to campus for a series of events in celebration of Willmott donating his personal collection of films, screenplays, posters, and more to the BFCA.

A screenwriter, director, producer, and University of Kansas professor emeritus, Kevin Willmott earned the Best Adapted Screenplay Academy Award in 2019 for co-writing Spike Lee's BlacKkKlansman. He has written for the stage, television, and the big screen, and his directorial



work includes two Sundance Film Festival selections—C.S.A.: The Confederate States of America (2004) and The Only Good Indian (2009)—as well as Destination Planet Negro (2013), The 24th (2020), and most recently, the documentary No Place Like Home: The Struggle Against Hate in Kansas (2023). His current project is the Peacock miniseries Excellence: 8 Fights, which chronicles eight defining moments in Muhammad Ali's life; Willmott wrote the series and is co-producing it with actors Morgan Freeman and Regé-Jean Page. In addition to filmmaking, Willmott has made an incredible impact on his hometown of Junction City, Kansas, by fighting for the rights of the poor, creating two Catholic Worker shelters for unhoused people, and forcing the integration of several long-standing segregated institutions.

This September, join us as we spotlight the filmmaker with:

- A screening of *The 24th*, a historical drama directed and co-written by Willmott about the all-Black 24th United States Infantry Regiment in World War I, followed by a Q&A with Willmott
- An onstage conversation with the filmmaker as part of our Jorgensen Guest Filmmaker Series
- A screening of BlackkKlansman, the wild true story of a Black policeman's infiltration of the KKK which will be followed by a Q&A with Willmott

With work that critically examines America's racial history, Willmott operates in many genres, exploiting their potential to represent characters and subjects generally avoided by mainstream film. He is also committed to producing stories situated in the landscape and history of his native Kansas, creating a Midwestern aspect to his filmmaking that reminds us of the potential of cinema to reveal a deep structure that is both local and universal.
